# RJH SEES IT

In less than 100 days, we will be gathering at the Esmeralda Resort and Spa in Indian Wells, California for the NAATP Annual Leadership Conference, but more importantly to celebrate the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the National Association of Addiction Treatment Providers. Little did those brave and visionary individuals who signed the articles of incorporation in 1978 know that their association would attract organizations from Maine to Montana, from California to Connecticut, from Texas to British Columbia, from Ontario to Oklahoma. Who would have known!

These same visionary individuals would also not have known that this group of ten would very quickly grow to a membership of nearly 700 in the late 1980's. In just 10 years, NAATP would burst onto the scene and represent some of the largest and the best providers of addiction treatment. Then again, those same visionary figures in 1978 would not have known that even quicker than it took to reach 700 members, the membership of NAATP would tumble to below 100. Managed care, discrimination, *Newsweek*, *CBS Stories* and so many other events contributed to create a climate which made it unpopular to seek treatment for addiction and difficult if not impossible to operate a business delivering addiction treatment. So the thirty year history of NAATP (1978-2008) has been anything but a straight line!

It is precisely because our history has been so dynamic that we deserve and, in fact, must celebrate our history. We must remember where we came from, who has provided vision and leadership, and where we yet must go.

As we look back in the archives of NAATP, we see that we celebrated the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of NAATP with a "black tie" event in Chicago. We were pretty snappy then as we used a big fancy hotel in downtown Chicago and had a very nice dance as part of the celebration. More than likely we thought that it could only get better. That was 1993. Then five years later in 1998, our membership had dropped to below 100. Not only did we not have a dinner dance at the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary, we hardly had a dinner as only 65 persons were in attendance for this annual conference.

But being the resilient types that we are, when 2003 rolled around we were ready to really do it up right and celebrate our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. So the Esmeralda Resort and Spa was the location for this 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a wonderful luncheon. Unfortunately the luncheon was held outside and the temperature was so hot that those in attendance had to place their silverware in their water glass so that they could hold them. A memorable if not humorous event! Despite the temperature and the unfortunate decision to hold the luncheon outside, we had the absolute privilege of having President and Mrs. Ford attend our celebration and share some absolutely inspiring thoughts.

## Highlights of some articles you will find in Recovery Solutions Magazine

**Q What happens when the brain binges on alcohol? (Dept of Drug Facts)**

## CELEBRATE YOUR HISTORY - - IT'S ALL YOURS!

In 2008, NAATP will celebrate its 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary. William White has written a book detailing its history that will be available soon. The purpose of this message isn't to promote the book, but more importantly to encourage you to remember and celebrate the history of our field and the history of your institution. We must all remember and celebrate our past - - because it belongs to all of us!

In addition to NAATP marking its 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary, Father Martin's Ashley will also celebrate its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2008. Caron Treatment Centers and Alina Lodge celebrated 50 years in 2007 and The Betty Ford Center and Marworth celebrated 25 years. All of these institutions made a "big deal" out of their anniversary year, holding numerous celebrations to commemorate the past. They highlighted the vision of their founders and gave gratitude for the early pioneers of their institutions who overcame obstacles to ensure that the current and future generation of employees, alumni, and other members of their constituency would benefit from the values and traditions of those who went before them.

Such is the case with NAATP as we celebrate our 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary, this May in Indian Wells, California. We will acknowledge and pay tribute to the visionaries who saw the need for a National Association of Addiction Treatment Providers. We will salute those pioneers who overcame challenges in a field that has been plagued by "ups and downs" and we will highlight the values and esteemed character of those that have gone before us.

With the growth of the recovery realm over the past decade, many new facilities, and service providers, have entered this field. Like their senior counterparts, it is important for new treatment facilities to formally record their history and acknowledge the contributions of their founders. I would like to encourage you to take two important actions. First, learn about the field. Understand from whence we came. Clearly knowing the history of addiction treatment will help you appreciate the background of your association, but also I believe it goes far beyond that and everyone should be familiar with those individuals and institutions that helped to establish the addiction treatment field as we know it today. William White's Slaying the Dragon is a great resource for a thorough overview of treatment and recovery in the United States.

Secondly, I would encourage you to record your history. Keep track of the individuals and events that provide your organization with the values and character your organization embodies today. Anniversary years that end in 5 and 10 are clearly great opportunities to formally mark your history and alumni reunions are wonderful opportunities to share a "walk down memory lane" with your constituency. However, I encourage you to start preparing right away for those red-letter dates in your institution's history. You will need to apprise your employees as you begin to record your history so that your staff understands how your history fits into that of the overall field and the important role they will play in future reunions. This can be readily done during orientation, annual all employee meetings or other appropriate employee events.

You may even begin to make your history visible to your alumni, patients and visitors, as do many older institutions such as Caron. Caron has a Heritage Center, which displays archives with a timeline highlighting those important developments over the past 50 years. Memorabilia, artifacts, pictures, and even audio and video clippings from our founders and other key leaders provide a detailed narrative of Caron's story. We have also published Caron's history in "coffee table" books for alumni, referents, and employees.

As you can see, there are many ways that you can record and share your history with your constituency. It's not important how you do it, only that you do it. I would like to encourage all of you to "just do it." Our past (the fields' and our respective institutions) - - is what makes us unique; it's all ours - - we just need to remember that and celebrate it!
